STOCKPORT GRAMMAR SCHOOL NEWSLETTER



This December's production of *Les Misérables* brought together a cast and crew of more than eighty pupils from across different year groups. The audience at each of the six sell-out performances enjoyed a magical performance complete with 2 ½ hours of music, a 21-piece orchestra, a complete set designed and constructed in-house, a circular revolving stage and elaborate sound and lighting. Rapturous applause made all the hard work worthwhile as the performers recreated Victor Hugo's epic tale of injustice, heroism and love. All the principals gave outstanding performances, and Head Boy Chris Ambrose shone in the role of the hero Jean Valjean. Two Second Year pupils, Simon Hardy (Gavroche) and Cara Bills (Little Cosette), made their lead debuts.

The West End production of *Les Misérables* is the world's longest running musical, and the school's adaptation retained all the magic of the original show including famous songs such as *At the End of the Day*, as well as the poignant *Castle on a Cloud* and the rousing *One Day More.* Following the success of last year's Fiddler on the Roof, SGS had a lot to live up to, but it was unanimously agreed that the cast and crew succeeded in this, the school's greatest theatrical challenge in recent memory.





OLYMPIC SILVER MEDALLIST VISITS JUNIOR SCHOOL

Pupils in the Junior School had a special visitor to their morning assembly when Olympic swimmer and Silver medallist Keri-Anne Payne called in. Wearing her Olympic medal Keri-Anne gave an inspirational talk to pupils about how she got to the Olympics in Beijing.



Keri-Anne, who trains with Stockport Metro Swimming Club, talked to pupils about the commitment and hard work needed to succeed in her Open Water event. Keri-Anne has been swimming since the age of four and trains for over 25 hours a week. She told pupils that no matter what they are doing, whether it is sport or homework, they need to put in 100% and be dedicated to what they do. Her advice was, "Enjoy it, work hard and have fun".

At the end of assembly Keri-Anne was presented with flowers as a thank you before helping to present the Good Work Awards. She then spent time with pupils from the school's swimming team, four of whom also train with Stockport Metro Swimming Club.

Keri-Anne is the second Olympic medal winner to visit the school this year. Her visit follows on from that of Sharron Davies, who was at SGS for Speech Day in July, where she presented the year's achievement awards.

TRIUMPH AT MODERN FOREIGN LANGUAGES DEBATING COMPETITION



Pupils recently attended the Modern Foreign Languages Debating Competition, held at Cheadle

Hulme School. The French team of Caroline Tanner and Steven Townend won their competition convincingly, beating Manchester High School for Girls, Bolton Boys', St Bede's and Bolton Girls' in the final. The German team of James Toole and Gemma Darwin were also very successful, winning two out of three of their debates. Well done all!



THE PETER BOARDMAN CLIMBING WALL

The official dedication of the Peter Boardman Climbing Wall took place this term. Peter was a former pupil at SGS and a worldrenowned climber. When he climbed Mount Everest in 1975 he was the youngest person to have reached the summit. Peter went missing in 1982, once again climbing Mount Everest. The dedication of the climbing wall was carried out by Pat Littlejohn OBE, Director of the International School of Mountaineering. Peter's widow Hilary Rhodes and Peter's brother John Boardman also attended the evening and spoke at the dedication. After the speeches Pat Littlejohn (pictured left) carried out an inaugural climb of the wall, followed shortly after by climbers from the school's Climbing Club.

NATIVITY STARS

In the run-up to the Christmas break the Junior School performed two magical Nativity Plays. The first, Whoops-a-daisy Angel was performed by children in the Nursery and Reception. The second was by Year 1 and 2 pupils and was called *The Magical Christmas Box*. Both were well attended by parents, relatives and School Governors – none of whom could have failed to have been impressed with the performances.





BATTLEFIELDS TRIP 2008

During autumn half term two coaches filled with 78 Third Year pupils and eight members of staff headed off on the annual Battlefields Trip. For the first part of their trip pupils spent time in Northern France, visiting the area of the Somme Battlefields, where they laid a wreath at the Thiepval Memorial to the Missing of the Somme in memory of Old Stopfordians. Pupils also visited Le Grande Mine, the Newfoundland Memorial, and the Albert Museum, an underground museum which traces life in the trenches during the war.



The second part of their trip was to Ypres in Belgium where pupils laid a wreath at Tyne Cot, the largest Commonwealth cemetery. They also visited the German Cemetery, Langemarck, as well as visiting Hill 60, In Flanders Field Museum and Essex Farm Cemetery. During the trip all pupils had wooden crosses with poppies on. They wrote messages on these and laid them wherever they felt appropriate. One pupil, Max Murphy, found the grave of a relative and laid his poppy there.

In their free time pupils visited a local chocolate shop to include in famous Belgian chocolate. On their last night they enjoyed an evening meal together before going to the Last Post Ceremony at Menin Gate, where every night since 1928 the Last Post has been played.







REMEMBRANCE SERVICE

As the country marked 90 years since the signing of the Armistice to end World War I, pupils joined staff, Governors and over 80 Old Stopfordians for a special Remembrance Day Service. Following a speech from Headmaster Mr Chicken, Fifth Year pupil Colin Greaves played the Last Post to mark the beginning of the two-minute silence. After the service, Old Stopfordians who left the School between 1930 and 1955 stayed for lunch. Christopher Willcock (OS 1948) spoke about his recent work to produce a more accurate World War II Roll of Honour for SGS.

At their first meeting members of the Council were joined by teachers Mr Ehegartner and Miss Withington, the Proctor Mr Ashcroft, and the Bursar Mr Watson, who oversaw the proceedings and explained the importance of the Council in the future of the school.

MOCK TRIAL FINALISTS

SGS produced a record-breaking performance in the 2008 Sir Rhys Davies Mock Trial Competition, scoring the most points and reaching the final for the first time. Fiona Turner and Caroline Tanner were the barristers in the first case, defending Will Archer who played a Spanish student accused of unlawful wounding. Their performances secured a comprehensive victory over Manchester Grammar School. In the next trial, Sophie Spence and Charlotte Lennon performed very well, assisted by Kitty Piper as a confident born-again Christian and Lauren Deutsch as a landlord accused of blackmail, edging out William Hulme School by a point. Fiona and Caroline then defeated Alderley Edge School for Girls in the last case and reached the final. The team had an enjoyable day and deserve great credit for their achievements.

INTERVIEW WITH EOIN COLFER

Brother and sister Charlie and Gabby Smith attended the Cheltenham Literary Festival where they met up with bestselling children's author, Eoin Colfer. Charlie was invited to interview Eoin about his books, the most famous of



which are the *Artemis Fowl* novels, a series which stars a teenage criminal mastermind who takes charge of rebuilding his family fortune following the disappearance of his father. Eoin isn't the first author to be interviewed by Charlie. He has previously questioned Anthony Horowitz (the *Alex Rider* novels, *The Power of Five*) and David Gilman (*The Devil's Breath, Ice Claw*) and has now been invited by Puffin Books to be a Deputy Editor for their Book Club.



CLASSICS TRIP TO LONDON

Thirty-eight Lower and Upper Sixth Classicists together with Mr Thorley, Mr Bird and Mrs Othen visited London. Pupils started the day at the British Museum seeing the sculptures from the Parthenon and considering the impact of the *Statuephilia* exhibition where modern sculptures, including one of Kate Moss made from solid gold, are juxtaposed with ancient works. After lunch pupils went to the National Theatre to see *Oedipus* starring Ralph Fiennes in the title role, providing pupils with the opportunity to compare a professional performance to the one staged at SGS last year. On the way back to Euston, a small detour was made to the National Gallery to see relatively modern interpretations of Classical stories including Turner's *Odysseus deriding Polyphemus* and Titian's *Diana and Actaeon*.

SERENADE CONCERT

Old Stops, together with current pupils and parents, gathered in the Hallam Hall to welcome former pupil and internationally-respected recorder player John Turner (OS 1961). John was at SGS to perform a Serenade Concert with fellow musicians, soprano Lesley-Jane Rogers and pianist Stephen Bettaney (OS 1964), in aid of the May Turner Scholarship Fund. SGS is a Duke of Edinburgh Independent Operating Authority and is the most successful independent school offering the Award in the North West.
