Results Day

Congratulations to our A Level and GCSE students on their amazing academic achievements.

At A Level, 79% of the grades were awarded at A* to B and 57% were at A* to A. At GCSE, 77% of the grades were awarded at 9, 8 and 7 and 31% were awarded the highest mark of 9.

Headmaster Dr Paul Owen said: "Our students have worked extremely hard, adapting to remote learning and dealing with considerable pressures and disruption from covid with incredible resilience. I have been hugely impressed by the academic ambition and determination they have shown throughout their time at SGS. Their commitment and the dedication of their teachers has enabled them to achieve the highest academic standards and to develop their wider talents to the full. I am simply delighted by this excellent set of results.

"I wish them every success as they look forward to starting their courses at prestigious universities across the country and look forward to welcoming the large majority of our GCSE students into the Sixth Form."

Among the students celebrating their grades, Head Girl Jessica Horsford and Isobel Gardner will both be heading to Cambridge University to study Medicine.

Jessica gained 4 A*s, while Isobel secured 3 A*s and an A and they will be joined at Cambridge by Lauren Hedley whose 2 A*s and 2 As see her take up her place to study Economics.

Zoe Shah is also going to Oxford to study English Language and Literature. Alex Patsias's 4 A*s in Chemistry, Further Maths, Mathematics and Physics will see him heading to Imperial College London to study Mechanical Engineering.

Nervousness turned to relief for Jack Hargreaves as he picked up his GCSE results of ten 9s and one 8. He praised the remote learning that the school provided during lockdown and is looking forward to studying Chemistry, Further Maths, Mathematics and Physics at A Level. At the 2021-2022 Speech Day he picked up the Fifth Year Mathematics Prize. Anna Collins-Room was delighted to receive nine 9s. She said: "I wasn't expecting my results

at all! I am happy that all my revision was worth it."

Celebratory openings for the new Nursery and Sixth Form Centre buildings

Speech Day at Stockport Grammar School was an extra-special occasion this year with the official openings of the new Nursery and Sixth Form Centre buildings by Chairman of Governors Mr Christopher Dunn.

The new single-storey Nursery building, complete with exciting new play areas and an eco-friendly living green roof, sits within the grounds of the Junior School.

The Sixth Form students also have a new modern space to call their own, featuring a large social space with a stunning glass roof, study rooms and a café. The café, called Edmond's, is named after the School's foundation in 1487 by Sir Edmond Shaa, Lord Mayor of London and Prime Warden of the Goldsmiths' Company.

This year's Speech Day speaker was David Saddington, a climate change communicator who began his activism journey while still at school. Before heading to The Plaza to award the prizes, David met with our Eco Schools committee. He was really impressed with all the eco-friendly measures they had helped to put in place around SGS and helped them to come up with new ideas. Head Girl Jessica Horsford and Head Boy Harry Brown received the traditional Gold medals from the Prime Warden of the Goldsmiths' Company, The Lord Mark Bridges KCVO.

CO-CURRICULAR



Geographers head to Manchester

Lower Sixth geographers ventured to Manchester and Llandudno to practise collecting data for their non-examined assessment.

The students travelled to Beswick and the Etihad Campus, looking at sports-led regeneration, social housing and inequality as well as factors shaping place identity and the effects of deindustrialisation and regeneration in Ancoats, New Islington and the Northern Quarter.

The students used a range of techniques including clone-town surveying, environmental impacts assessments, environmental quality surveys and questionnaires to gather data.

On the North Wales coast, Mr Cooke, Mrs Crowley and Mrs Fitzgerald led the Geography students as they implemented a variety of field methods to practise collecting data in a Physical Geography context.

Studies were located at Westshore Beach and the sand dune system on the Irish Sea, using a range of field methods to collect data to help them analyse wave, beach and cliff processes, sediment cell geology, dune and vegetation succession, and coastal management.



Zoo trip interests Psychology students

Forty Lower Sixth Psychology students visited Chester Zoo to consider animal behaviour.

The group explored the zoo and saw the animals before having a guided tour focusing on the topics of attachment and relationships in apes and what this tells us about human behaviour too.

It was a hot and sunny day that was informative and enjoyed by all.



Poet recites verses

The English department were delighted to welcome Welsh poet Owen Sheers to SGS as he gave a moving talk and poetry reading to students from the Lower Sixth from his 2005 collection 'Skirrid Hill'.

The Sixth Formers study the collection for their A-level examination and they enjoyed the opportunity to ask questions, which led to deeper insights into the writing process, as well as the meanings of the poems.

During the visit, Owen explored the themes of love, loss, heartbreak and masculinity in the 21st Century.

Upper Sixth student Talia Zelhof delivered a thought-provoking 'Spotlight On...' as she explored the question 'Can we consent to actual bodily harm or murder?'

During her presentation, she looked at a number of cases that included issues such as cannibalism and euthanasia and, at the end, she fielded some questions from an intrigued audience.

The week was based around a challenging overnight expedition. On the days not spent on expedition, pupils took part in other activities, including canoeing – all with the focus of developing their understanding of their team and their role within it.

Westminster welcomes Lower Sixth

A group of Lower Sixth students headed to London to visit the Houses of Parliament and the Supreme Court.

The first part of the trip was a guided tour of the House of Commons and House of Lords, led by a member of the Parliament Education Centre's team.

The group were led through the Robing Room and the Division Lobbies into the two chambers themselves, each getting the opportunity to stand at the dispatch box and imagine themselves being in the shoes of the Prime Minister.

The group also spent time in Central Lobby before heading into Westminster Hall. For the historians, this allowed the opportunity to visualise the trial of Charles I in 1648 from where he was sat!

The afternoon session was spent in the Supreme Court, where the pupils were able to visit the two court rooms and learn about the distinct and important functions of the highest court in the UK.

Sports Day

Towards the end of the Summer
Term, Senior and Junior School pupils
took part in track and field events to
earn points for their Houses during their
Sports Days.

Second Year pupils were the first year group to head outside and compete.

Special mentions go to Molly Mills who broke the Second Year records for javelin (28.12 metres) and 300m (44.44 seconds) and Chris Parikh who clocked a record time of 41.77 seconds in the 300m.

The Fourth Year Sports Day competition saw Nicholson take maximum points.

There was extra cause for celebration as Arden broke the Fourth Year record for the Boys' 4×100 metres. The record of 48.90 seconds, which had stood since 1988, was usurped by the new record of 48.81.

Lower Sixth students were the penultimate year group to compete.

The day was made even more memorable as three new records were created. In the Boys' Shot, Isaac Deans's 13.50 metres effort beat the previous record of 12.81 that was set 45 years ago in 1977! The 1989 Boys' 1,500m record of 4:27:30 minutes was smashed by Tom Manton as he clocked an impressive 4:22:57.

In the Girls' 300m, Amy Jack beat the five-year-old record of 51.30 seconds as she crossed the line in a time of 50:27.

First Year Sports Day was the final competition to take place and two 4 x 100m relay records from 2009 were beaten during the event. The Girls' B team smashed the previous record of 67.00 seconds with a time of 64.55, whilst the Boys' B team clocked a time of 63.60 – beating the previous best of 64.10.

Photographs and Cyanotypes
