Headmaster's message

The calendar year 2022 saw five different people hold the office of Secretary of State for Education. Whilst this allowed for a pleasing mix of genders and ethnicities amongst the post holders, it did



little to promote stability in national educational leadership. What does excellence in education look like? How should schools prepare young people for life (personal and professional) in a world that seems less predictable and less stable than previously? Schools have returned to normal after the restrictions of the covid era with even public examinations re-established after 2 years of absence. It seems unlikely, however, that politicians have had the time to think afresh about these questions and steer the national debate. Headteachers, on the other hand, have ample opportunity and motivation to try to answer them, immersed, as they are, in the full vibrancy of school life and blessed with a longer tenure than Education Secretaries.

At SGS we have three aims for the education we offer to all our pupils.

Firstly: Academic Ambition. Engaging lessons, a broad curriculum and a culture that encourages curiosity and challenge all help our pupils to achieve highly. Last summer 77% of our GCSE grades were at 7, 8 or 9 with 31% at the very highest grade of 9. At A Level 57% of grades were at A or A*, allowing the vast majority of our Sixth Formers to proceed to the university course of their choice with six students beginning studies at Oxford or Cambridge.

Secondly: Beyond the Classroom. We offer an enormous range of cocurricular activities: sport, music, drama, outdoor pursuits and much more to allow our pupils to find new talents and develop them. There are plenty of articles in this magazine that celebrate not only our pupils' achievements in different fields but also their participation.

Thirdly: Care, Community and Character. All our pupils gain from being part of a community and from learning to work with and learn from other people who have different talents, interests and experiences. We encourage them to develop in personality, to grow in enthusiasm, curiosity and grit, to be 'good with people' and to contribute to the wider community.

Our pupils have great examination grades, a broad range of interests and the character to take full advantage of the opportunities offered to them: an excellent education and a good preparation for life.
