What are your greatest memories of your school life?

I still remember so clearly the exhilarating experience of being part of a choir singing 'Zadok the Priest' in a large venue. But one of my best musical memories from school was going on a Choir tour to Germany, travelling along the Rhine and performing at various venues along the way.

The area of school life that I think really developed my confidence and communication skills was drama. Whether it was in the school pantomime (there may be some embarrassing photos of me as Aladdin somewhere!) or in something more serious, I learnt the importance of practice and preparation and the thrill and adrenaline rush of a live performance.

Here at SGS, there are so many opportunities for pupils to take part in clubs, activities and trips as we can see in this edition of Taking Stock. My advice to every pupil is to embrace these opportunities so that you can have the experiences that might inspire you and shape the person you become. I hope this allows your memories of SGS to be as wide-ranging and fond as my own school memories.



Careers Convention

This year's Careers
Convention was a great
success with more than 300
pupils and their parents
attending to meet with 76
delegates representing 21
universities and 40 employers
and professions.

Careers Co-ordinator Mrs Helen Tadman said: "Our biennial Careers Convention, which is for Fourth Year, Fifth **Year and Sixth Form** pupils and their parents, was incredibly well attended and there were representatives from many different fields. Many of our speakers commented on how our pupils asked interesting and relevant questions to find out about what they did. We hope the evening will have inspired many of the pupils to think about their future options."



At the end of the Summer Term 17 pupils from Fifth Year to Upper Sixth embarked on a Biology expedition with the biodiversity research and conservation organisation, Operation Wallacea.

The pupils spent two and a half weeks in Honduras, discovering the terrestrial and marine fauna and flora of the Meso-American corridor.

Time was spent in the Cusuco National Park where pupils assisted teams of researchers as they completed mist net bat and bird sampling, transect sampling of herpetofauna, searching for reptiles and amphibians, and light trapping of invertebrates including a number of moth species and the endemic jewel scarab beetle.

Pupils were also lucky enough to assist Dr Erica McAlister in her research into wasp and bee larvae for the Natural History Museum.

The biologists continued their work on Utila, part of the Honduran Bay Islands.

For their second week, some pupils completed their PADI Open Water dive qualification, whilst others completed a Caribbean Reef Ecology course with the practicals carried out either by diving or snorkelling.

Pupils were taught how to identify many of the different aquatic organisms common in the coral reefs at Utila.

During this week, the group also met up with Laura Service (former SGS Biology teacher and Old Stopfordian) who was delivering the course to University research assistants.
